In a world increasingly shaped by Al-driven innovation, how do authors navigate the complexities of copyright law? This presentation explores the intersection of artificial intelligence and intellectual property, addressing pressing questions about authorship, ownership, and accountability.

CWC Marin President Jean Gordon Kocienda will set the stage with a basic "AI for Dummies"-style demo of tools such as Chat GPT and Canva, generating a short story, a query letter, artwork, and a bio in a matter of minutes.

Next, Dan will examine the ethical issues and legal challenges AI brings to writers and artists. Plenty of time will be left for Q&A as we discuss strategies you can put to work in this rapidly evolving landscape.

Dr. C. Daniel Miller is a co-founder and co-owner of Integrated Writer Services, LLC, which provides copyright consulting and clearance service. He formerly served as president of the Collective of Independent Publishers and Authors (CIPA), previously known as the Colorado Independent Publishers Association. Dr. Miller regularly speaks and conducts workshops on "Copyright Basics" and "Copyright in the Age of Artificial Intelligence." These presentations are designed for authors, independent publishers, and other creative professionals.

In addition to his consulting work, Dr. Miller is working on a second edition of the award-winning Copyright Clearance for Creatives, which serves as a guide to copyright issues for the creative community. The new edition will include a section on copyright and artificial intelligence (AI). Through his various roles, Dr. Miller contributes to the copyright literacy of individuals needed to help them ethically create and use copyrighted materials in the digital age.


Introducing Auto-Renewal



genres were represented.



Al: How I went from Naysayer to Yaysayer in Four Months

Like many of you, I've been dubious about using artificial intelligence (AI), especially for fiction. I felt that avoiding AI was the morally right thing to do since the big players in the AI field committed the original sin of using practically every writer's work without their permission to train their "robots." And if AI companies used everything on the internet to train their products, what's to say they won't steal your writing if they get a whiff of it?

Then there's the whole issue of getting your work published. If I used AI just to help me write an article (not actually write the whole thing without hardly touching my keyboard), then won't publishers reject my work?

And what about the stigma? I didn't want anyone to think I was a lazy hack who needed a bot to write for me.

I didn't think using AI for research was any better. I'd heard AI makes up stuff half the time and is otherwise unreliable. In

January, I gave ChatGPT a try, the most well-known "language model" as they're called, for finding book comps. It provided a list of twelve made-up author and title names. I was right! Al was crap.

Then, one of our CWC members recommended another language model for editing. **CONTINUE READING...**

About Robin Cohn: I aspired to be a feminist theologian, an archaeologist, and a writer. Voila! Writing historical fiction about the ancient women of the Bible ticked all the boxes. My writing explores the idea that many ancient women wielded more power and influence than is often recognized. By utilizing the tools of modern research, I've been able to reconstruct the stories of these brave, wise, and sometimes treacherous biblical characters.

I'm a transplant from Seattle, and I've made myself at home here by running every trail and street in San Francisco and the entire county of Marin. I live in Sausalito.
